Make Your Own Top Ten List

It's hard to believe that when you choose a college, you have the possibility of 3,500 two- and four-year colleges and you'll have just one to attend. Here are some tips on narrowing down your choices and making your own Top Ten list to work with.

- Think about how colleges differ: Four-year, two-year, number of students, location, tuition, majors offered, type of school, and student activities. What's important to you?
- Visit different types of schools so you understand what it's like to be on a campus with 5,000 or 25,000 other students or what it's like to be in a small town.
- Narrow down colleges by how close or far away they are from home, average student GPA, even majors offered. If you know what you want to study, finding a school that offers a strong program in that major

can be more important to you than the prestige of a certain school.

- Make your college visits when school is in session. Visit a classroom, talk to professors and students, eat in the cafeteria, stay in a dorm room – experience the college. CollegeBound Foundation's one day tours are free and Specialists have a comprehensive list of fall open house events, overnight visit opportunities and fly-in programs.
- Take charge of the search. Work with your parents, counselor or CollegeBound Specialist as a team, but lead the effort, take responsibility, and determine what would be the best choice for you.
- Be realistic. Use your time wisely and look only at colleges you think you would really want to attend.

What Questions to Ask at College Fairs

- Does the school have a liberal arts, technical, or pre-professional focus?
- What percent of freshmen return for their sophomore year?
- What sort of extra-curricular activities are offered?
- What types of facilities are available for drama, music and athletics?
- What types of career advising and support services are offered?
- How are financial aid needs met?
- What types of jobs or graduate and professional schools do most students enter upon graduation?

CollegeBound's College Application Sticker Program

There are rewards for maintaining excellence attendance and grades. CollegeBound Specialists have college application fee waivers for seniors who maintained a 94% attendance rate in their junior year or are ranked in the top 15% of their class. These college application fee waivers may be used for most four-year colleges and universities in Maryland and over 130 out-of-state institutions.

A college tour is like a window-shopping trip for the college bound student -- an unofficial first step in the increasingly rigorous admissions process. CollegeBound provides students an opportunity to participate in one-day college tours at no cost and overnight tours for a modest fee. Tour participants will meet with admissions and financial aid staff; shadow college students in classes, dorms and dining facilities; and become empowered to make informed decisions about selecting a college.
